Summary

We have been developing an understanding of the lives of Christina McPhee, her parents, siblings and grandparents.

These notes are a place to preserve details which don't yet easily fit into our family tree – so they can be found if they are later found to be relevant to our stories..

Details have been gathered about early McPhee families around Lochaber – as well as those who migrated to Australia. We have not yet gathered relevant details of the Camerons.

Some possibilities are explored of people of the generation of Christina McPhee's parents in the hope that we might be able to find a link back to Christina. This might be her uncles and aunts – and help identify her siblings and cousins, or others she grew up with. We are recording these bits and pieces in this document in the hope that, with luck, we will eventually be able to join the dots for our family history.

What were the Interconnections between the families?

In Scotland:

- There were certainly interactions, if not direct kinship, between three families in the first four decades of the 1700s – two McPhee families on the north shore of Loch Eil and our McLeans on the south shore.
- The children were of similar ages within small communities of a few hundred people in proximity (although distances of a few miles would be more of an impediment than now days).
- We can be confident that the two McPhee families were in close contact with each other – as cousins if not siblings. Jan Harper alluded to this, 'There was at least one other McPhee family in Kinlochiel' (Harper, p10).
- Maybe there was less intermingling, but at least some contact, with the McLeans who were at Duiskey – just 5 miles from Kinlochiel.

In Australia:

- Apart from a Donald McPhee living in Strathalbyn, we have no indications of Australian contact between the various McPhee families and the McLeans.

Other migrants

We do not know whether there are any connections with Christina McPhee with the following:-

- Malcolm McPhee, aged 34, a farm servant, who arrived in South Australia in 1855 aboard the ship "Switzerland"
- Munro McPhee, aged 50, a crofter, who arrived in South Australia in 1855 aboard the ship "Switzerland"
- Colin McPhee, aged 38, a labourer, who arrived in South Australia in 1858 aboard the ship "Frenchman"
- Margaret McPhee, aged 17, a domestic servant, who arrived in South Australia in 1858 aboard the "Frenchman"
- Mary McPhee, aged 14, a domestic servant, who arrived in South Australia in 1858 aboard the ship "Frenchman"

This list will not take us anywhere unless we can find out where they migrated from - hopefully from somewhere in Lochaber/Kilmallie/Crieff.

The following six family groups might give us some clues. Some of these families migrated to Australia but of course, our interest is in any of their ancestors in Scotland in the 1700s.

Comment: Could these Donald's be related to 'our' Christina?

- Birth date: Christina was born 45 years before Donald (snr) - 1787 Vs 1832. Donald (jnr) was born in Merino Vic in 1857 or 1854 and would have been a teenager when Christina died in 1869.
- Birthplace: Christina was born Crieff. Other members of her family were born in Lochaber, Glenorchy, Kilmallie & Urquhart. Donald (snr) was born a long way away in Inverness 5 years before Christina migrated - and he migrated as a 23 year old, 7 years after Christina.
- They were both buried in Strathalbyn – Christina in 1869 and Donald (snr) 1892 (23 years after Christina)
- They probably never met because they probably never lived in Strathalbyn at the same time. Christina was there from 1840 to 1869 but it is not clear when Donald lived there. We know that he was married in Wattle Flat in 1856 and his son was born in Merino in 1854 or 1857 - but we don't know when and where his 7 daughters were born. It seems that the earliest that he might have settled in Strathalbyn was in the late 1850s – when he was in his late 20s and Christina was in her early 70s. In this case their paths might have crossed because it was a small community - but not significant contact in view of their age difference. It is more likely that he moved there either just before Christina died or after she had died – maybe many years after she had died.
- Were they related? They are two generations apart. So Donald (snr) might have been a grand-nephew – ie descendant of one of Christina's brothers. There would be many people with the surname of McPhee – and so there might not be a 'useful' relationship. We need more information (eg who his parents and grandparents were) - otherwise we can only guess.

Family group B: John McPhee of Lochaber & daughter Christina of Redfern

- Source: page 80 of Percival Conrad Mowle's 'Genealogical History of Pioneer Families of Australia – 1872 to 1951'
- On 25th April 1889 at St Paul in Redfern Sydney, a Christina married Frederick xxxxx (he was born 26th Feb 1846 and died 19th Aug 1928 at Narrandera NSW).
- She was the youngest daughter of John McPhee of Lochaber, South Inverness.
- Christina and Frederick had children.
- She died on 16th May 1933.
- Comment: This Christina would have been born before 1870 and her father would have been born in the first half of the 1800s might have been born 7 or 8 decades after 'our' Christina. She might have been born a little before 'our' Christina died. Thus, there is a chance that her father (John) was the grandson of 'our' John oig McPhee – ie her father might have been a nephew of our 'Christina' – ie the son of one of Christina's brothers. This is all just guesswork as there were probably many people called John McPhee in Lochaber in those years. We have no indications that 'our' Christina had any contact with any distant relatives in NSW.

Family group D: Margaret & Ewen McPhee – per Sally's website

- Source: Sally McPhee's TNG website: fortunatusfamilia.com.au. See [appendix B & C](#).
- The website is managed by Sally McPhee who is Ewen's 4 X great granddaughter. It is assumed that she lives in Australia because her parents were married in Toowoomba in 1956. Her website states that "*I will try and answer short queries. However, if an individual is not on the site or I don't have details in the notes section then I can't help. However, I am always happy to compare research notes.*"
- Names: The website includes Ewen MacPhee which is a name suggested in the BRB – based on traditional naming patterns. Ewen's wife was Margaret – her surname is not known. The BRB suggested that Christina's mother might have been named Mary.
- Birth date: Ewen MacPhee and Margaret were both born about 1755, which would place them within the year range of Christina's parents. This year might have been calculated by Sally MacPhee, based on the fact that it was 23 years before the birth of their only known child, Alexander.
- Birthplace: Ewen and Margaret were born somewhere in Scotland. This general location is not a lot of help to us, except that his son, Alexander, was born in Kilmallie in 1778 – and six of Alexander's children were born in Kilmallie between the years 1808 and 1828. Now Kilmallie is a large parish – with a small population widely spread, but mostly along the northern shores of Loch Eil. This does not include Blaich and Duisky that are on the southern shores, but does include the area where Jan Harper's McPhees came from. (see below).
- Siblings: The website has Ewen & Margaret having only one child, Alexander, and nothing to indicate that they had a child named Christina. This might not be conclusive because there are probably gaps in the records since it would be unusual for a fertile couple to have just one child in that era.
- Comments:
 - Father: The name, place and date for Ewen MacPhee indicate that he could be Christina's father.
 - Mother: It is possible that Margaret could be her mother. The indication that the traditional naming pattern does not support this is no big deal.
 - Conclusion: It is possible that Margaret & Ewen were Christina's parents and Alexander was her brother - but we have nothing to confirm this = MAYBE.
 - At least, Christina she might have been their niece and thus Alexander would have been her first cousin and their children (ie children of Christina and Donald McLean) would have grown up knowing each other because they were of similar ages (born 1808-1828 Vs 1811-1836) and were living close by – across the narrow loch, within sight of each other.
- Task: Ask Sally for her ideas – after we have re-worked these notes.

Family group E: Donald McPHEE & Mary, nee McKENZIE – Jan Harper’s book

- In 1989, Jan Harper, nee McPhee was living in 62 Relowe Cres, Box Hill North, Victoria.
- Names: The BRB suggested that Christina’s father would be Ewen MacPhee – this is based on traditional naming patterns. In this case, the name Donald does not fit the pattern however the mother, Mary, is OK. Thus, as with Margaret & Ewen (see family [group D, above](#)), we have one of the parents (in this case, the mother Mary) with a name which complies to the traditional naming pattern.
- Birth date: The birth dates of Donald and Mary are not recorded in the book but based, on the fact that their children were born between the years 1778 and 1782, we can assume that the parents were born no later than 1760 and probably sometime in the two decades prior to this – ie 1740’s and 1750’s. This is the expected generation or year range for parents of Christina.
- Birth place: No birth place is given for Donald and Mary but their first two children were born in Callert on Loch Leven (North Ballachulish) and the family later moved about 22 miles to Fassfern, which is on the north side of the Loch Eil, directly across from Duisky.
- Siblings: Jan’s book records that Donald and Mary had four children (ref: Harper p11 & p4 – see [appendix D](#)):-
 - Ann: She was born in 1779.
 - Donald: Born 1782
 - Charles: Married Kath McMillan and they had 7 children - four of whom migrated to Australia:
 - ◇ Alex: born 1806
 - ◇ William: born 1808
 - ◇ Donald: born 1810, migrated to Australia, died 1892
 - ◇ Angus: born 1814
 - ◇ Hugh: born 1820, migrated to Australia
 - ◇ Jean: born 1821, migrated to Australia
 - ◇ Ann: born 1823, migrated to Australia, married Donald MacPhee (first cousin), died 1866
 - Duncan: Born 1778 and died 1861 [[research](#): Where?]. He was a crofter. He married Mary Cameron who was born in 1781 and died 1842. Like Charles and Kath, Duncan and Mary also had seven children and again, four of the seven children migrated to Australia.
 - ◇ Mary: born 1807, married Duncan McVicar (shoemaker) and Mr Sinclair, migrated to Australia, died 1889
 - ◇ John: born 1809, baker, married Mary MacColl, migrated to Australia, died 1877
 - ◇ Anne: born 1810, married Malcolm Colquhoun
 - ◇ Duncan: born 1811, ploughman
 - ◇ Donald: born 1812, farmer, married Ann McPhee (1823-1866) (first cousin), migrated to Australia.
 - ◇ Flory: born 1817, servant
 - ◇ Alexander (Sandy): He was born in 15th Aug 1822. He was an apprenticed baker in Fort William. In 1849 he went to the Californian gold fields, then to the Victorian gold fields in 1852. He was a baker and farmer in various locations over subsequent years. On 19th July 1859, he married Elizabeth ROSS (1829-1908). He died on 16th April 1910
 - ◇ There are no indications that they had a child called Christina but this but this might not be conclusive because there are probably gaps in the records.
- Jan’s book focusses on Alexander who was her 3 X great grandfather. Alexander McPhee’s parents were Duncan and Mary, nee Cameron. He was born in 1822 and lived in Kinlocheil, which is on the western end of Loch Eil about 5 miles from Duisky. He migrated to Victoria (via California) in 1852.
- Comments:-
 - Names, year and place: These all are compatible with what we know about Christina, but there is no direct evidence that Donald and Mary were her parents.
 - Conclusion = MAYBE
 - We could speculate whether this McPhee family knew the children of Christina and Donald McLean whose birth years ranged from 1811-1836 Vs 1806-1823 & 1807-1822. It is likely that

they were in contact on the shores of Loch Eil. However, we have not indications that any of them had contact with each other in Australia after many of them had migrated to different colonies. For example, Alexander migrated to Victoria 15 years after the McLeans had migrated to South Australia.

Family group F: Catherine MacPhee – crofter in Garvan in 1845

- From Ardgour-MacLean paper – bundle 12, “*Precognitions, Blaich, 8 July 1845, as to action of Suspension and Interdict between Catherine, daughter to Hugh Rankine, and widow to John MacPhee, outgoing tenant of No.4 Croft, Garvan, and Alexander Maclean of Ardgour and Duncan Cameron, incoming tenant, as to Estate Regulation outgoing tenant leave half of outgoing straw crop on the croft, with Copy letters from Messrs. Ferrier and Duff, W.S., Edinburgh, to James MacGregor, writer, Fort William, and to Alexander Maclean of Ardgour, 8 August 1845, as to Lord Robertson's Interlocutor in said case. With notes as to arrangements made when Garvan was crofted about 1810.*”
- From Ardgour-MacLean papers – bundle 12, “*Letter from Charles Spence, writer, 21 St. David Street, Edinburgh, to Alexander McLean of Ardgour, 14 August 1845, as to case of Widow Catherine McPhee, with allegations she had been refused use of barn to thresh her straw, and that estate regulations had not existed when she got possession of her croft.*”

Family group G: Donald McPhee (born 1792) & **Catherine McPhee** (born 1792)

- 29th April 2020 - Rodney Jonasson -
- *I've matched DNA with a tree with McPhee ancestors in Argyllshire Scotland, in particular Donald McPhee 1792-1870.*
- *Parents noted as John and Catherine, with no evidence*
- *He married Catherine McPhee also 1792-1870, parents Angus McPhee and Mary McMillan*

Clan MacFie History

Although its origins are obscure, Clan Macfie is acknowledged as one of the oldest Scottish Clans. It has been claimed that the Clan originated in Ireland before becoming established in Scotland and this may well be the case. Traditionally though, it's homeland is held to be the islands of Colonsay and Oronsay of the west coast of Scotland. A Clan presence in Lochaber, Galloway and on several other Hebridean islands is also evident from the earliest times.

In keeping with the times, the early years of Clan history had their turbulent periods as well as those of stability and honour. The islands of Colonsay and Oronsay were visited by the Vikings during their domination of the Western Isles and used as a base for raids to the south. There was Macfie contact with Iona in 1164 which no doubt led to the building of the Augustinian priory on Oronsay some 160 years later with a MacDuffie traditionally the Prior.

Macfie of Colonsay was present at the Battle of Bannockburn in 1314 when Robert the Bruce defeated the English under Edward II. The Macfie Chief was the hereditary Custodian of the Records of the MacDonald Lords of the Isles. In 1463 Macfie of Colonsay appears as a member of the Council of the Isles and in 1549 a successor is recorded as holding lands on Jura in addition to those on Colonsay.

In 1531 Macfie of Colonsay was cited for treason, still being a supporter of the forfeited Lordship of the Isles. Clan clashes with the McLeans of Duart on Mull were frequent in the latter part of that century. In 1609 Macfie of Colonsay was one of a number of Hebridean Chiefs forced to sign the Statutes of Iona. But in 1615 Malcolm, the last Macfie Chief, supported the uprising of Sir James MacDonald and thus started a chain of events which culminated in his murder in 1623 by his former colleague Col Kitto MacDonald. With the death of Malcolm, the Clan was dispossessed of its lands and dispersed as a broken clan. No line of succession from Chief Malcolm has been established.

The Clan heartland then moved to Lochaber where many Macfies lived beside the Camerons. A Macfie was one of two pipers at Glenfinnan when Bonnie Prince Charlie raised his banner there in 1745. The following year many Clan members died on the right flank at Culloden fighting alongside the Camerons. They share a common grave on that desolate moor.

Clan fortunes waned and many members in Scotland and Ireland became caught up, either voluntarily or through compulsion, in the dispersal of the Scots to North America and later Australia and New Zealand.
